



The computer has revolutionized American society in the last decade, becoming as common in homes as the telephone and the television. School children are introduced to computer education at a young age and are often more "computer literate" than their parents. However, the computer age has not reached all segments of American society, and those without its availability and opportunities are severely disadvantaged educationally. Such is the case with some Native Indian tribes of Northern California.

Relegating tribes to the least desirable lands has resulted in a lack of educational and economic opportunities. This is the case with the Karuk Indians.

Fortunately, Computers In Our Future (CIOF) has started a new program, and it is proving successful for helping Karuk youths in reaching their potential in the computer age. Various agencies and Indian tribal officials working with CIOF have opened a center. It provides computer technology to 100 percent of the aboriginal territory of the Karuk tribe. Though the Karuk people are beginning to have access to technology, they still do not have access to a culturally-appropriate church.



Pray that Christians will establish web sites which respect Karuk culture and glorify the God who created them. Pray that God will open the way for Christian workers to plant a culturally relevant church for the Karuks.—JS
